Lovely Whimple. Thank you so much for our very kind, thoughtful and generous gift. We are very touched by your kindness, and the timing is perfect. We are pretty exhausted and we will take the opportunity of time away whilst the floor is being installed and also, in the Spring, at Sally's lovely cottage in Padstow.

It has been physically and mentally tiring so some rest time will be much appreciated, and made all the more sweet, knowing that it comes with so much love and kind thoughts.

Whilst writing we are preparing for the floor installation. A little scared at removing everything from the shop in a couple of days and getting it back in again. Not worried about the professionals installing the flooring, but nervous about taking fittings down and getting them back in. We will be putting things back slightly differently. Hopefully, this will make the shop a little easier to use whilst social distancing is in place but, also, it will allow us to prepare to make the shop and store room all part of the same space.

This will give us a much more practical space to work from and allow us to separate off the current store room for use as a commercial unit or residence, depending on planning. Either way, it will help to keep the shop viable financially if we are using our space wisely.

We will continue to keep providing good quality produce, whilst keeping you as safe as possible through the coronavirus outbreak. Our new floor should make it easier for us to stay clean and safe. Ourselves and the staff will do everything we can to keep standards high but, if you have any concerns, please let us know.

From 1st September we hope to be reopening to normal hours. We just need to make a few tweaks to our usual working routines to make this possible. August for us is usually a quiet month, so it feels like there is no need to rush at a complete reopening just yet. A few more weeks will give us some time to sort out practicalities and allow us to spend some time on the shop layout, without any further closures.

The Post Office is continuing to be busy. We offer most services except those that require forms such as passports or DVLA. We are a paperless office so don't keep any forms. We are always happy to give advice on your posting or banking needs so please feel free to pop in or email whimplestores@gmail.com



Coleridge Medical Centre has been working hard behind the scenes to begin to open our doors safely and appropriately for our patients as we cautiously step back into the new 'normal' way of life. We would like to thank our patients for their adaptability and stoicism over the lockdown when there was such a massive shift in the way we delivered our services. The use of video consultation, telephone consultation and online consultation has rocketed, limiting exposure for both staff and patients, and has largely been well received. Our community teams have been working tirelessly to deliver care to our vulnerable, housebound, sick, elderly and frail patients, along with sterling support from the voluntary sector.

We have been fortunate in Devon to have had low levels of COVID 19 and this was in no small part due to people being safe and sensible during lockdown. But we shouldn't be complacent and we must remain vigilant. We also recognise that for certain individuals their livelihoods have been threatened and their support networks removed. These factors, amongst others, have led to a massive surge in mental health issues, which we are trying to address. If you are struggling to cope, feeling low, anxious or overwhelmed by your thoughts and feelings, you can contact TALKWORKS Devon on 0300 555 3344. They are a free, confidential, NHS talking therapy service for people in Devon.

We will be sending invitations out over the forthcoming months for routine health screening, long term condition reviews and our annual flu vaccination programme. We intend to keep you safe when you visit us and social distancing measures and infection control measures are in place. There will be some physical changes you will notice to the layout of the practice. We ask that you wear a mask when you come to the surgery. These can be homemade and the Government has produced helpful guidance for how to make your own face covering at home.

If you do need to visit us, there will be plenty of information and signposting about how to stay safe and we will make this as efficient as possible for you and our staff. We are here to guide and support you if you have any queries or concerns.

A brief history of Whimple Stores - with huge thanks to Gillian Smith for digging out some files from the Heritage Centre

Firstly, my sincere apologies for any glaring omissions or mistakes in this article. I have only lived in Whimple since 2004 so have had to rely on the info I could collate. Please feel free to send us any additional articles for future publication - we always welcome any local stories and pics.

Snippets from the Heritage Centre files:

There were two Bakeries in The Square at one point - J. Grant's (where The Pea now is) and Read's Stores, on the current Whimple Stores site. Grant's seemed to be more of a general food store, too. There are some amazing receipts from this shop in the Heritage Centre files, dating back to 1915, when 5 fruit cakes cost 7s/6p.

In 1979 Grant's was an Antique Shop and, later, a Toy Museum, then a Gallery. In 2000, it became a private dwelling and B&B, The Jays.



Meanwhile, Read's looks to have become Powleslands Stores and Steam Bakery from the 30's to the late 50's. There is a receipt in the files for the paper deliveries (including the Radio Times) to Mr Whiteway, in January of that year, totalling £6 19s 6p.

A Mr E. Pettipierre appeared to take it over at some point and donated the Account Books he found to the Heritage Centre, dating back to 1936.

By the 70's, it seemed to belong to Anthony and Monica Smith, then Clive and Ruth Bennett by the end of that decade.

The licence was transferred again in 1981 to Alexander and Betty Scanes-Johnson, still in the same premises. In 1984 they advertised the hire of a Rolls Royce as an additional service!

However, in 1985, the licence for Whimble Stores was again transferred, this time to Fred and Pat Fowle, who moved down from Enfield. They had added video hire to their list of products by 1989....teabags were listed at 62p (decimal now) in April 1990.

The business changed hands again in 2000, when Fred and Pat retired and handed the business over to their son, Graham, and his wife Karen. Graham had previously been running a store on the New Inn (now Hive) site.

Graham also arranged an annual firework display at the Cricket Club, which was the first social event I attended as a 'blow-in' in November 2004. It was a great night.

Graham and Karen temporarily closed the business in 2008 and there was a lot of concern about this in Whimble, with a community shop being considered. However, they reopened and ran the Stores until 2014, when our current owners, Jenny and Mark Sanders took over.



What a long history the shop has had - over 100 years now.

Jenny and Mark have been great custodians in their years behind the counter, even taking on the Post Office when our village one was sold as a private home.

The difficult and, let's face it, scary, times we are experiencing at the moment have been made so much easier for our village by the dedication and help provided by the whole Sanders family (and team, before lockdown). They have been amazing and deserve every minute of the lovely break they will have, courtesy of wonderful, generous, grateful Whimble.

Although John was housebound for a long period of time and exasperated with being confined, there was never a dull moment in our house during that stage. His many friends all took the time to come by and visit him. Their company brought some respite and relief from the frustrations and instilled some normality again. So many people were on hand to offer assistance with various jobs which John would typically have carried out and this was a huge help to me and a relief to us both.

John wrote a short message to the village which was read out at his funeral and reads as follows: "I have to leave a big thank you to Whimble and its residents, particularly those I had the honour to call friends. The village has all the foibles of most villages but its community spirit is a constant winner!"

There genuinely are too many people to mention in this message but each and every kind-hearted gesture and act of good will has played its part in easing some of the burden along the way.

That being said, there are two very special people who I would like mention and to say a huge thank you to, from myself, my family and from John too. Chris and Kathy next door have been an incredible tower of strength and support for both John and I throughout the darkest of times and we truly can not thank them both enough for all that they have done and are still doing by just being there for me in my time of need.

Simply knowing that there are so many good people taking the time to help me through this grieving process, was a relief for John and continues to be a relief for my family members who aren't able to just call in on me. So, to all of you compassionate and generous friends, we'd like to say a huge "THANK YOU" for being here for us.

Hair today, gone tomorrow fundraising haircut, 20th June 2020

A huge thank you to everyone who supported my fundraising haircut on 20th June, both through donations and by encouraging me (and first time hairdresser Steve) on the day! As I have had long hair for most of my life, and had recently let it grow down to my waist, it was quite a big thing for me to cut it all off, but it really has been worthwhile. With your help, I raised over £1000 for ShelterBox, which is an amazing amount and will fund at least one Shelterbox (which on average cost £590). And that's not all. My half metre of (mainly) brown hair has also gone to a good cause and is now in the possession of the Little Princess Trust, who will use it (along with up to nine other hair donations) to make a real hair wig that they will give to a young person who has lost their hair.



I wanted to raise funds for ShelterBox as they do amazing work to support the most vulnerable people in practical ways – providing tents as well as tools, tarpaulins and other equipment that enable people to build or rebuild durable shelters. ShelterBox also provides other aid items such as mosquito nets, water filters, water carriers, solar lights, cooking sets, blankets and mats. Through my work in international development and specifically, weather and climate services, I know only too well that natural disasters are not waiting for the pandemic to be over. In May, people in Eastern India and Bangladesh were trying to rebuild their lives in the aftermath of Cyclone Amphan.

At the same time, in East Africa, where I have been working since 2014, communities in Kenya were trying to salvage crops damaged in floods whilst also fighting to control the country's worst invasion of locusts for more than 70 years. Meanwhile, in the informal settlements (slums) of Kibera in Nairobi and Kigogo in Dar es Salaam, the residents that I have been working with live in overcrowded, make-shift buildings with no electricity, running water or toilets. Sadly, for many communities, COVID-19 is the least of their worries as they struggle to find food, safe water and shelter. ShelterBox is meeting their most basic needs, providing emergency shelter to families who have lost their home to disaster, enabling them to rebuild their lives. Thank you for helping me to raise urgently needed funds for this fantastic charity.



Planet Sal's journey through lockdown (so far!)

As most of you know, I live in Whimble, but have a small shop in Honiton, called Planet Sal. I celebrated the shop's second birthday in lockdown, so it is still a new business.

Just after Christmas, I was thinking how far I had come, that I had begun to 'turn a corner' and was becoming a well-known little business in the area. So, everything that has happened afterwards was probably my fault! Never rest on your laurels, as my Mum used to say.

Along with many others, I think, I started out in February thinking that we may be lucky and escape the worst of this awful virus. But it soon became clear that things were escalating in Europe and I decided to scale back on my buying and see what happened. The week up to Mothering Sunday is a very important one for me, so it was a tough call not to order as much as usual, just in case. However, it did seem that lockdown would happen at about that time. In some ways, this was one of the saddest parts of it all for me. Families were coming in to buy cards and gifts that would fit through the letterbox of their Mums and Grandmothers, because they could not even go in and give them a hug.

When the announcement was made that non-essential shops would close, customers were so supportive on that last weekend and a lot just popped in to ask me to 'please be there afterwards'. It was very emotional.

I decided to board up the shop completely, for safety, and lovely Justin Harris from Whimble did this for me. Once he had gone I just stood outside and sobbed for two hours - I just couldn't stop. Not just for me, but for everyone closing down that weekend.

At first, it was unclear what help might be available, if any. Various announcements were being made, but I wasn't sure whether I would qualify. Our local EDDC representative, Kathy McLauchlan, was very helpful and kept me updated.

In the end, I did receive the government grant for small retailers and it was a huge relief. I knew then that I could pay my landlord for as long as it took, and also my suppliers - most of whom are small businesses themselves.



Lockdown time for me was made so much easier by the fact that I live in such an amazing village. Daily walks were a lovely way to have a distant chat and catch-up and the volunteers were doing a fabulous job. Quite a few people in the village also bought cards from me, which I could deliver to their door.

When the news came that we could reopen in June, I was a bit nervous. It had been so long and I was worried that people may no longer need the small shops, having bought online for so long. I also needed to get the 'love' back for my shop and its surroundings in Black Lion Court, which was looking a bit unloved.



So I ordered a load of Rustoleum paint (a revelation!) and a few of us set about painting all the gates, noticeboards and the famous lion statue, which ended up with a golden mane and being called Clarence!

This all really helped. Justin had returned and taken my boards down, so I set about the shop then, deep cleaning everything and putting all the safety signage and equipment in place.

I finished at 11pm on the Sunday, totally exhausted after being away from it so long.

With some trepidation, I opened the doors on Monday 15th June and waited...but then all my regulars started coming in! They were so lovely and glad to see me back!

It was Father's Day that weekend, so I had spent the very last of my grant on quite a lot of stock and cards, which was a big gamble. It did pay off though, and my first week was great, and very heartwarming.

It did get quieter after this until the cafes and pubs opened though, which was bound to be the case.

Now that we are six weeks down the line, I have to say that the 'shopping local' support has been amazing. Honiton does actually have a very wide diversity of shops, and the market has been extremely popular. Nearly everyone who comes in has a familiar face (many from Whimble) and I have been so grateful for the support.

We now have the visors and obligatory masks, which is another challenge, but, so far, my customers have been very respectful and kept within the guidelines.

I do feel lucky to have received the government support, when so many self-employed people did not qualify. It definitely saved my business from immediate closure.

Who knows what the future will bring us now? I really hope that the 'Support Local' message and feel-good factor continues, as it has been so appreciated. We live in a beautiful part of the world, which is a massive plus, but these times can be very frightening for those with health worries and the elderly amongst us. I see this in the shop on a daily basis and there are some sad stories out there.

I hope my little shop continues to help cheer folk up and feels safe for them. It is all I can ask for.

'Be kind' may sound like a cliché now, but those two words mean so much x





Whimble Parish Council

Parish Councillors Resignations – Cllr Peter Sibley and Cllr Paul Walsh have both regrettably resigned from the Parish Council due to their own increasing work and family commitments outside of their Parish Councillor duties. Both Peter and Paul have offered whatever support they could provide to the Parish Council moving forward. The Parish Council would like to thank Peter and Paul for their outstanding commitment during their time as Councillors and wish them and their families every success in the future.

Parish Councillor vacancies – As a result of the two resignations there are two Parish Councillor Vacancies to fill and formal notices of the vacancies have been posted by the clerk and EDDC. There has been a good response from residents with several expressions of interest received and I hope to be able to provide an update of the two new Parish Councillors in the next edition of Whimble News.

Greater Exeter Strategic Plan (GESP) – Whimble Parish Council will strongly object to the proposals ‘proposed’ for Whimble in the Document. The Parish Council would also expect EDDC to support the objections to the proposals for Whimble. The consultation period for all responses including resident responses opens in September and the Parish Council would urge all residents to read the document and submit their own responses to GESP in the consultation period.

1.1 The local authorities of East Devon, Exeter, Mid Devon, and Teignbridge are working together, engaging with stakeholders and communities, to prepare a new joint plan (in partnership with Devon County Council). The plan area is called Greater Exeter and it covers all of the four local authority areas, excluding Dartmoor National Park.

1.2 The Greater Exeter Strategic Plan (GESP) will be a formal statutory document, providing the overall spatial strategy and level of housing and employment land required in the period to 2040, together with key aspirations for the environment, infrastructure and digital communications. The document will provide the high level strategic planning policies for the area.

1.3 Local plans for each of the councils will continue to be prepared. They will contain more localised policies and allocations for smaller scale development. Communities are also still able to prepare neighbourhood development plans, looking even more closely at their local area. The timetable is to have the GESP adopted by 2023.

Once adopted the plan will supersede specified strategic parts of the existing development plan documents of East Devon, Exeter, Mid Devon and Teignbridge.

Opportunities

This site is identified for consideration in the GESP because

- It is close to Whimble train station.
- Whimble includes a number of essential services already which could be enhanced

- It could potentially help to address existing issues of flood risk
- Sensitivities - The site has a number of sensitivities which development would need to take into account, including:
 - It may impact upon the Pebblebed Heaths which are Natura 2000 protected wildlife sites sensitive to an increase in the number of visitors
 - Parts of the site is affected by flooding
 - Access from the A30 and across the railway insufficient for strategic scale development
 - Frequency of train and bus services in Whimble is poor. Some distance from Exeter and could increase pressure on the already at capacity Junction 29 of the M5

- A number of Listed Buildings exist within and nearby the site. Development could have the potential to impact upon the setting of Whimble Conservation Area
- Local primary school provision at/approaching capacity. Clyst Vale Community College lies a significant distance away and the school has limited scope for expansion
- Topography and landscape sensitivity/visual prominence in some parts of the site
- A large proportion of the site is high grade agricultural land
- Site includes and borders multiple County Wildlife Sites and may contain Great Crested Newts and other protected species It may be visible from the East Devon Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty

Requirements

- Planning requirements for the site will aim to create a great place to live and work, providing well designed new neighbourhoods with appropriate and well managed public open space and safe walking/cycling routes.
- All sites will need to provide a mix of homes (including affordable and custom build), investment in low carbon energy and transport, high speed internet and wildlife enhancements. More detail on these can be found in the policies within Section B of this document. Other emerging requirements include:
- Funding of measures to reduce the impact on the Pebblebed Heaths including provision of Suitable Alternative Natural Greenspace (SANG)
- Measures to address the risk of flooding on site
- Rail infrastructure improvements to enable half-hourly train service frequency
- Significant improvements to vehicular access from the B3174 plus railway crossings
- Pedestrian and cycle connectivity to jobs and services at Cranbrook and the West End
- On-site primary school provision including early years and on-site secondary school provision
- High quality design and layout to reduce the impact upon heritage assets
- A variety of amenities and services including a small amount of convenience retail, local employment,
- sports, recreation and healthcare provision
- Development will need to respect the privacy of existing dwellings located nearby

Parish Meetings – Although there has been a relaxation of some of the Covid-19 restrictions with business and Village Halls starting to re-open current legislation is in place for Parish Councils to hold Parish Meetings virtually (currently up to April 2021) instead of ‘face to face’ meetings. Therefore, until there is a relaxation of the policy the Parish Council will continue to hold virtual Parish Meetings and publish the dates and times of these in its Website and on EDDC website. As always members of the public are welcome to attend.

Neighbourhood Plan – With Covid-19 legislation now permitting virtual meetings and on completion of the appointment of two new Parish Councillors the Parish Councillors are keen to progress the NP through to completion. The clerk has already made contact with the members of the NP steering groups and more details will follow shortly.

S106 – Play/Sport Equipment – Following on from the consultation and residents vote that took place the Parish Council are going to tender to obtain quotes and plans to provide a multi surface area suitable for bikes, scooters and skaters aimed at residents of all ages along with a new small play area that would be more suitable for children. The project is limited by the s106 budget and clearly the size of the track will reflect this

Town Lane Recreation Ground became the preferred location for some of the following reasons:-

a. A specialist made a site inspection and recommended Town Lane Recreation Ground over the Parish Field due to the site being more level and having better drainage. To level the area and install drainage, at a suggested cost of up to approximately £20k in the Parish Field to cater for the track would make the project unviable. There would be insufficient funds left after any amount of drainage/levelling costs to complete the project.

b. S106 funds are split into two parts – sports and play. EDDC determine that part of these funds - Play can only be spent in the Town Lane Recreation Ground. The sport element which would relate in this instance to the track can be spent in either site. This makes Town Lane Recreation Ground the only viable option for the whole play/sport project.

c. Town Lane Recreation Ground has always been, and remains, a designated Play area but has been neglected for many years due to lack of funds. The facility needs to be improved and the location in the centre of the village is less remote for many users compared to the Parish Field which is located on one far edge of the village.

d. Town Lane Recreation Ground already has lighting nearby with a potential in the future to add additional lights subject to planning and costing. There are no plans currently to add additional lighting due to a lack of funds. The Parish Field has no lighting where the track would need to be placed and the cost of bringing electricity and lights to the site would be prohibitive. The trees along the bottom of the Parish Field screen the light from Slewton Crescent and in the winter the Parish Field is in almost total darkness. Town Lane Recreation Ground should therefore be a safer area for children and residents.

There have been significantly less incidents of ASB/vandalism in the Town Lane Recreation Ground than the Parish Field over the recent years and particularly in the last 12 months where in the Parish Field for example benches have been vandalised, sprayed with graffiti and thrown down by the stream. With the existing lighting Town Lane Recreation Ground could be used at more times, particularly in the winter.

e. The public car park in the centre of the village is underused and would be close to the new facilities. There is no off-road parking near the Parish Field. The Cricket Club now keep their gate locked at their entrance due to recent instances of ASB and only open the gate for cricket/football maintenance purposes.

I will keep residents updated on any progress with the tendering process. When the tenders are received the Parish Council will discuss the tenders in Parish Meeting which, as always, members of the public are welcome to attend. Currently due to Covid-19 restrictions Parish Meetings remain 'virtual' but as we know the situation changes almost daily!

In the world of Town and Country Planning, nothing is going to stop developers trying to build on more of our Devon Green Fields. In fact it feels like 'open season' as most people have other matters on their minds. Members of the **POW+R group** are keeping an eye out for local planning applications and local press. We have learnt that McDonald's will not be serving burgers at Daisy Mount. Critically, it's also open season for local government sneaking out the biggest planning change in history for Devon- in the Coronavirus pandemic haze.

POW+R Group's last campaign was the proposed development of land west of Gribble Lane for 200 homes, adjacent to The Grange Hotel (Planning application reference 19/1798/MOUT). Currently it is 'awaiting decision'. A big thank you to all those local residents who submitted representations regarding this proposed development. We now await the outcome with bated breath!

The Cranbrook Master Plan is now dealing with Stage 14 - The Cranbrook Plan Examination Statements. **POW&R** has made representations in documentary evidence and in verbal statements, having provided submissions on ALL nineteen MATTERS to the Inspector. Since the final examination session was postponed in mid-February due to unresolved matters pertaining to the viability of the proposed development, East Devon District Council have been working to update their viability appraisal and explore whether mediation is appropriate in bringing the parties together on the issue of viability. We are also awaiting the publication of an update to the Sustainability Appraisal in relation to site allocations for gypsy and

traveller provision, prior to the hearing sessions being reconvened hopefully in the Autumn, although we await news of a date in due course.

Cranbrook Town Council has asked residents to vote in an online poll about the future of the town centre. From the very beginning back in 2010, a town centre was considered a priority as part of the original outline planning permission for the first 2,900 homes, according to East Devon District Council. Residents are being urged to choose between two proposals for the town centre vision; one proposed by the consortium of developers that is less ambitious but could be delivered sooner, or one proposed by EDDC that aims to be more ambitious in its delivery, but could take longer to come to fruition with no timescale currently proposed. To find out more about the proposals and to vote visit:

The other major planning issue is the **Greater Exeter Strategic Plan**. The local authorities of East Devon, Exeter City, Mid Devon and Teignbridge are currently in the process of taking reports to the four Local Authority committees to consider whether to begin the next round of consultation on their Strategic Plan. The plan includes draft planning policies and large-scale development options across all four Council areas up to the year 2040. The proposals are vast and if approved, will signal enormous changes for the Greater Exeter area, including Whimble and Rockbeare.

Each local authority planning committee will be asked to agree the 'draft policies and site options' document and agree the procedure for a public consultation to begin in September. The East Devon Strategic Planning Committee discussed this on the 23rd July 2020. More details are available online under **Greater Exeter Strategic Plan - www.gesp.org.uk**.

Subject to agreement on the procedure for public consultation, members of the public, organisations, developers, local authorities and parishes will be able to comment on the planning material from 21st September until the 16th November by following the prompts on the website.

Neighbourhood Plans have been increasingly used in the planning process and give the opportunity for the local community to contribute towards shaping their area. In creating the GESP, consideration of Local Neighbourhood Plans should be taken into account. Whimble is still struggling to get its own Neighbourhood Plan actioned, and social distancing restrictions due to Covid 19 are not helping in getting this very urgent process underway. POW+R urges Whimble Parish Council to find a way to move forward with this extremely urgent business before it is too late.

The GESP proposes an area of land designated for housing development of 242 hectares joined to the East of Whimble for circa 2,500 homes, with a mix of housing and employment uses. More detail is certainly required and **POW+R** will be working hard to protect our beautiful village from becoming a new dormitory town for Exeter. The character, vitality and sense of community of our attractive village would no longer exist in a landscape of soulless mediocrity of urban development and of poor architectural merit.

The Greater Exeter Strategic Plan. What will it mean for Whimble?

Keen followers of planning within East Devon will know that four councils (East Devon District Council, Exeter City Council, Teignbridge District Council and Mid-Devon District Council) have been working closely for some years to produce an integrated plan for housing development within the area around Exeter.



The purpose of working together on the Greater Exeter Strategic Plan (GESP) has been to speak as one voice at Westminster to achieve the levels of funding required for infrastructure, mostly notably on the rail and road networks.

Government policy calls for ever increasing numbers of houses (full market and affordable housing) and employment land. Housing numbers are 'handed down' to districts from national Government and it is impossible to argue against the numbers in an effort to reduce them.

Planners working on GESP issued a 'call for sites' (basically by contacting landowners to see if they were willing to put their land forward for development) for sites of 500 homes or more.

Within East Devon, development is constrained by two-thirds of the district being protected landscapes (Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty of the Blackdown Hills and East Devon AONB), which inevitably means that the 'northwest quadrant' of the district is the most suitable place for development.

In addition, transport corridors are a factor – in particular communities benefitting from a railway station were identified, the thinking being that people travelling to work can use the most sustainable means of transport possible. Obviously within the hierarchy of sustainability working from home is the most sustainable, then walking, then cycling, then train or bus and finally the car.

GESP was discussed at length at **Strategic Planning Committee on Thursday, 23 July**, The meeting was also aired on YouTube (<https://www.youtube.com/user/eastdevoncouncil1>) and can still be viewed.

I have argued, and will continue to do so, that Whimble (and indeed Feniton) are not the most sustainable locations because the train service is infrequent. Plans are being formulated to build the 'Whimble passing loop' which would theoretically increase the number of trains using the Exeter to Waterloo line and provide a half-hourly service.

However, there are two significant issues with the passing loop, and until these are resolved I cannot see that Whimble can be considered a sustainable location. Firstly, is the cost. This is absolutely eye-watering.

Despite this project having been on the drawing board for well over a decade, with questions having been asked in the House of Commons, sources of funding have not been identified and, given the huge amount the Government has committed during the Covid crisis, it is to be wondered if it'll be a priority. Secondly, the current proposal envisages that trains would not necessarily stop at all stations ... in other words, Whimple is unlikely to benefit to any considerable extent from the new passing loop.

However, despite all of the above, Whimple is vulnerable, there will inevitably have to be some development in Whimple, probably through the Local Plan process, rather than GESP. The GESP plan (www.gesp.org.uk/) runs to 2040 so can be considered to be a high-level, long-term plan. Running alongside GESP, each of the four Councils has a Local Plan. The current one for East Devon runs to 2031.

Meanwhile, the four councils, with their new administrations in place, are seeking agreement of Councillors to progress the Greater Exeter Strategic Plan by putting the plan out for consultation in September. If this is agreed, it will be another opportunity to make views known.

The Strategic Planning meeting took place and GESP was voted against, however it was the full council (before my time as a councillor) who originally voted to join GESP. And therefore it can only be stopped by a full council voting to reject it. The date for that meeting is yet to be chosen. The meeting of the Strategic planning committee was 4.5 hours long and consisted of 15 councillors, there will be 60 councillors at the full council and I think the complexity of this will take twice as long to decide.

Councils to consider Greater Exeter Plan proposals

East Devon District Council's Strategic Planning committee will meet on Thursday 23 July to discuss plan

East Devon, Exeter, Mid Devon and Teignbridge councils are all considering whether to begin the next round of consultation on the Greater Exeter Strategic Plan (GESP). Exeter City Council is the first of the authorities to discuss the proposals at a meeting next Tuesday 7 July and they published the GESP document today. (Monday June 29)

Due to the coronavirus pandemic, the first opportunity for East Devon District Council's Strategic Planning committee to meet and view the proposals is on Thursday 23 July. The council has committed to nothing more than deciding whether to take part in the consultations on the plan which would take place from September.

The GESP proposals include draft planning policies and large scale development options across all four council areas for the next twenty years up to 2040. It will tackle big planning issues affecting the Greater Exeter area, of which East Devon is part. The GESP will also identify possible development sites across the area, including large regeneration sites in Exeter.

Cllr Paul Arnott, East Devon District Council's Leader, said: "The last councils of 2015-19, and 2019-20, took part in an internal discussion with other councils about co-operating as a joint planning entity.

"With a new administration for 2020-21, this is to be considered at the Strategic Planning committee on 23rd July in the emerging post-Covid-19 context and we will need to assess it anew in light of the possible changed shape of housing need and the economy.

"Our friends at Exeter have begun to discuss the GESP document analysing the call for sites, but of course, until our own Strategic Planning committee discusses the next steps the district council's position on going out to consultation is not yet decided."

Teignbridge District Council will discuss the proposals on Tuesday 21 July, and Mid Devon District Council on Thursday 6 August.

The councils have been asked to carry out the consultation from September, which was originally planned for June, following Government advice that planning authorities should continue despite Covid-19. The consultation would ask for the public to have their say on the draft policies and site options, which would influence the next stage.





When requested enter the access code 2673601 followed by # (referred to as "pound sign" by the automated voice). When requested say your name followed again by #. You have now joined the meeting.







I don't think any of us would have predicted what has happened and how our lives have changed in the past few months. Schools were asked to reopen to Reception, Year 1 and Year 6 children at the beginning of June as well as maintaining provision for keyworkers. I have been really lucky to have such an amazing set of staff and governors who support each other and want the best for all the children at school. This has meant that not only have we had over 60 children in school regularly, we have been able to have all of our other children who have wanted to, back in for a week. We have seen and taught 87% of our pupils, that is 122 children during the second half of the summer term.



Whilst there has been a focus on key skills like reading, writing and maths, lots of other activities have taken place.

Reception have looked at minibeasts and enjoyed their outdoor provision.



Year 1 have travelled around the world finding out about various animals and their habitats. They have dressed in saris and, in RE, they have explored Buddhism, learning the story of the Buddha and the significance of the lotus flower, the Bodhi tree and the wheel of life.



Lego characters have been designed and made along with a variety of science experiments.



Returning groups of children in each bubble were really creative during their week and they took part so well in all of the activities they were asked to do, including daily writing challenges, 3D model making, Beebot programming, scavenger hunting, PE tasks, painting, pastel, collage and more.



Year 6 have also been involved in lots of activities including completing their Civic Award and being interviewed and questioned by some of our governors.



We say goodbye to Mrs Sally Terrett, who started with us, initially, as a parent, then as a teaching assistant and more recently as our Early Years teacher.

Mr James Terrett has also finished his time as a parent governor as his youngest child now leaves the school. He has been a governor for 14 years and has brought a wealth of expertise and experience to the team. They will be greatly missed.

Finally, I would like to thank everyone - staff, governors, parents, children and all those who support us in the village community. It has been the most challenging school year yet and your support and faith in us has been greatly appreciated.

We will see you all in September.
