Whimple 250k Club - Autumn Update

Thank you for your continued support of our monthly lottery. Since starting in April 2024, the 250k club has grown to become the single largest source of fundraising income for the Victory Hall. It is now contributing approximately £400 a month to our restoration fund.

Grant and donation applications

The Parish Council is happy to receive applications from local community and voluntary organisations with a maximum limit of £300 and one application per year. Applications are subject to the criteria set out in the Council's Policy (which is available on the website) and includes the following:

- Only one application for a grant will be considered in each financial year
- Ongoing commitments to award grants in future years will not be made
- A limit of £300.00 per organisation will be applied except for exceptional circumstances.
- The organisation must be non-profit making (and not an individual)
- Grants are not made retrospectively
- The organisation must be one that, in some way, benefits the local community
- The organisation may be asked to demonstrate a clear need for financial support by providing a description of the project / activity for which a contribution is needed

Applications will next be considered at the November Council meeting and applications must be with the Clerk by 31 October 2025.

Community Speed Watch Initiative

Dear neighbour

I hope this update finds you well as we head towards Christmas. There's been significant progress on several fronts that I'm pleased to report on, alongside some important developments that will affect our community.

Local Plan Updates

At the last Strategic Planning Committee meeting, I was able to secure additional protection for the visual



separation between Cranbrook and Whimple that is so important to maintaining the character of our village. Specifically, I ensured that the Green Wedge policy now includes an explicit requirement that any housing on site Whim_08 must not breach the ridge atop the slope to the west of the site. This provision will help preserve the landscape views that are so valued by residents.

Given the many questions I've received about the site allocations and the planning process more generally, I have also established a new Local Plan FAQ page at toddolive.mycouncillor.org.uk/local-plan-faq. This resource aims to provide clear answers to the most common queries I receive, and I'll be updating it regularly as new questions arise.

By the time you read this, we will have published much of the detailed work that East Devon has been doing to ensure that our new settlement – now named Marlcombe following the public vote – learns the lessons of Cranbrook. This includes a comprehensive plan for what facilities need to be included in the new settlement and, crucially, how we are going to make sure they are actually delivered. I firmly believe the council has much to prove in this field, having allowed private developers to make such a mess of Cranbrook, but I'm genuinely proud to have been involved in this work and confident it will deliver not only new, affordable homes, but also a genuinely great place to live.

We will also have published – or will imminently be doing so – the full Infrastructure Delivery Plan accompanying the new Local Plan. This document details the investments needed to accompany new housing developments across East Devon, covering schools, roads, healthcare, and more.

Major Housing and Infrastructure Commitments

I'm pleased to report that East Devon has signed off on a £100m plan to deliver five hundred new genuinely affordable homes for local residents over the next five years. This represents a significant step up in the council's ambitions for social housing delivery and will put a big dent in the list of over 2000 families on the housing waiting list.

East Devon's Cabinet has also committed to a £2 million investment in developing detailed plans for a new leisure centre in Cranbrook Town Centre. The facility will include a full 25m swimming pool, learner pool, modern gym, and spin studio, and is expected to be delivered within the next three years. This represents exactly the kind of up-front infrastructure investment that was so lacking in Cranbrook's early development.

Local Government Reorganisation

You may have seen that Exeter City has now published its proposals for Local Government Reorganisation, which would see large parts of East Devon – including Whimple – absorbed into a new city-dominated council. As I have made clear previously, I will be strongly opposing any proposal that would see our rural area subsumed into an "Exeter+" authority dominated by urban concerns and priorities. A Note on Facebook and Getting in Touch

Finally, I wanted to address an issue that has unfortunately affected how I communicate with residents. I've mentioned before the threatening voicemails I had been receiving from an anonymous caller. These have continued in recent months, almost exclusively coinciding with times I've engaged with people on Facebook – on my own page, on Whimple What's On, and in other groups. Having discussed this with appropriate people and taken advice, I was advised over the summer to discontinue using the platform for my own safety. As a result, I have ceased using Facebook.

This isn't what I'd like to do – but I'm tired of feeling like I can't safely use my office at The Hive alone into the evening, or even just check my voicemails. I will still receive messages sent directly to my Councillor page and, as always, I am very happy to speak via email, on the phone, or at my monthly surgeries – or indeed to arrange other times to meet, in person or virtually. If you have a question or issue, or if you want to discuss something you might not agree with me about or ask me to explain a decision, I remain – as ever – happy to engage via these other channels.

By the time you read this the Heritage Centre will have closed for the winter after a glorious summer of seemingly endless sunny days, which have probably enticed more people to the beach than to museums. Nevertheless, we are pleased to report that our visitor numbers have held up and were roughly the same as last year.

We are now turning our thoughts to our winter programme of talks. Last year we were given a large quantity of documents relating to the Whiteway's Cyder Company. One of our committee members, Jo Yarwood, has been

assisting me with the sorting, cataloguing and digitising of these documents – a lengthy job which is not yet finished! However, it has inspired Jo to put together a talk about the history of Whiteway's with particular emphasis upon its advertising. Her talk will take place at 7.30pm on Friday 10th October 2025. Those of you who came to Jo's talk about 'the history of infectious disease and immunisation' last year will know what an accomplished speaker she is, so please put this date in your diaries and come along for what we are sure will be an entertaining and informative evening.

For our second talk of the season, we are experimenting with a different time slot. It will take place at 3pm on Sunday 2nd November 2025, and we are keen to know if the different time slot makes it easier or more difficult for you to attend, so please do give your feedback on which you prefer to our committee members or by sending us an email.

The subject of the talk is the history of Exeter Airport during World War Two, and the speaker is Chris Wiseman. Chris spent his career working for the Devon Ambulance Service, having been forced to give up on his wish to join the RAF owing to colour blindness. He is now spending his retirement researching the history of Exeter Airport, and gives talks about it across the local area and, occasionally, further afield. Chris is also the area manager of the Devon branch of the Battle of Britain Historical Society. He has told me that it is his ambition to get premises at the airport to house his collection of airport memorabilia in a small museum.

Our final speaker of 2025, Ian Gregory, has already achieved his ambition of starting his own museum. His talk is about an appropriate subject to get you in the mood for Christmas – toys! *I Bought a Church: The Story of Sidmouth Toy and Model Museum* tells the story of the museum which houses the collection of toys and models built up by Ian and Rebecca Gregory over the course of many years, together with some others which are on loan or have been donated. This talk will take place at the usual time of 7.30pm on Friday 28th November 2025.

On a different subject, we have a small room at the rear of the Heritage Centre which is little used. Would there be any demand from groups within the village to hire it by the hour? The room is approximately 12ft², and tea and coffee making facilities would be available. Please contact us if you would be interested.


We would love for the Whimpletons to carry on but feel as a very loyal and long standing committee we would like to take a step back (not completely exiting stage right)!

Celebrating Abundance: Harvest Festival in Whimple.

'As the first crisp winds of autumn blow across the fields and the trees begin their slow transformation into golden flame, the simple country folk of Whimple will gather once again to celebrate one of its most cherished traditions — the annual Harvest Festival.

Held in the quaint stone church that has stood at the heart of the village for centuries, the Harvest Festival brings together farmers, families, and friends to give thanks for the year's bounty and to celebrate community spirit. Like every week the church will be packed but at Harvest a very special atmosphere of joy and contentment will fill the smiling villagers, drawn from every generation of country folk, the congregation will give thanks for another full and happy year.

The church nave will be filled with the rich scent of apples, fresh hay, and baking bread. Woven baskets overflowed with local produce — carrots, potatoes, beets, and beans — lovingly donated by the farming families, arriving by tractor and trailer and even by hand pushed wheelbarrow and arranged by the church's large team of ever-dedicated flower arrangers. Hand-tied wheat sheaves will stand proudly near the altar, a traditional symbol of the season's abundance.

Children from both the church choir and the school choir will fill the air with their voices, performing hymns like "We Plough the Fields and Scatter" and a spirited rendition of "All things bright and beautiful" Dressed in hand-made crowns of leaves and sunflowers, and drawn from our village brownies and guides, cubs and scouts, the children will be beaming as they bring forward a huge array of fresh foods and canned goods for the poor and needy— and for many parents and grandparents in the pews, there will not be a dry eye in sight.

Rev Marc, one of our priests will lead us through another fascinating piece of scripture and no doubt one of his several curates will lead prayers; following the service the congregation will make its way joyfully to the village hall where the church refreshments team will have been busy preparing a hearty feast for one hundred plus rumbling stomachs; long tables will be groaning under the weight of homemade pies, casseroles, and jams. There will be hot mugs of cider, pumpkin scones, and blackberry crumbles still warm from the oven. The children will no doubt dash about with sticky fingers and flushed cheeks, while the older generations swap stories over cups of tea.

This year's Harvest Raffle — featuring prizes like a hamper of homemade preserves and a voucher for Mrs. Jennings' famous carrot cake — will be in aid of the church roof fund.

As the sun dips low over the fields and the laughter slowly fades into the dusk, there will be a shared sense of peace and an expectation for another wonderful year ahead'.

That, my friends, is what you get if you ask ChatGTP to write you an article about a harvest festival; a sepia-toned image of what happens in church at Harvest. Of course, it isn't totally wrong, but it is also a fair way from being right as well.

It is wrong because it sets the celebration of harvest in a remote 'Vicar of Dibley' halcyon dream like world of full churches and country bumkin villagers, a picture like one of Turner's masterpieces of a world which never really existed, except in our imaginations, and in doing so highlights one of the challenges facing the modern church: how do we celebrate the hope of our faith at Harvest whilst also acknowledging how complicated the real world is, that there is scarcity and hunger, how difficult people's lives can be and how tricky being a Christian is today. And how do we continue to honour ancient and much-loved rural traditions but also appeal to younger generations.

Well, we are going to have a crack at it this year in two different ways.

On Saturday 11th October we are going to be hosting a Harvest Brunch at the church - details on page 2. We have never done this before but are trialling it as lots of folks have asked for it. If it proves popular it might become an annual event and you are going to need to book as the wonderful Jane Clements is organising things but even she cannot organise catering if she has no idea who is coming! - sign up at the back of the church or email Jane at jane.e.clements@gmail.com. It is due to start at noon, which is brilliant as it means folks could come along to our churchyard clear-up at 9.00am to help us get things looking ship-shape before winter and then stay for the brunch. There will be a bible reading and a short reflection on it, plus some prayers and it is intended to be relaxed and informal. Further details to follow. Then on Sunday 19th October at 10:30am we will be having a harvest festival combined with a farming family baptism at church. If you have been to one of our 'Gatherings' on a Sunday, you will have an idea of how this celebration is going to run. Good coffee, cake and time for conversation before the start, our live band (with both traditional harvest hymns and some more modern), an interview with some of our young farmers, a short reflection on a Bible passage, plus a baptism, and generally a lot of fun. It is going to last less than an hour and be a totally family friendly event grounded in the reality of parish and farming life.



HEARD OF MEN'S SHEDS?

Some of you may not be familiar with Men's 'Shedding'. It started in Australia around the 1980s as a way to improve the health and wellbeing of older men. Now, the movement has grown up and out across the world, some Sheds including anyone regardless of age or gender. Men's sheds are found in the United Kingdom, Ireland, United States, Canada, Finland, Estonia, New Zealand and Greece.

The journey to a Men's Shed is, for some men, marked by a life-change such as retirement; redundancy; health challenges. There could be a change in their family circumstances such as the loss of a spouse, divorce or relocation. A purposeful and friendly environment like a Shed has the potential to improve general wellbeing and challenge social isolation.

An initial idea from the RVS and Ottery Help Scheme fired a few enthusiastic men to open our own Ottery Shed back in November 2016 and, with the help of the Town Council, we rented a large portacabin in the old Station carpark. There quickly arose a cry from our members that it was not big enough! A long search for a place where we could build our own Shed then began.

A piece of land was hard to find, but we had our big break four years later when we were actually offered a defunct business space in Hind Street - all 110 square metres of it - some five times the size of our portacabin! Funds squirreled away for building could then be channelled into some meaningful pieces of workshop machinery and safety equipment.



Having been given a carte blanche to organise our new home, we set to work at the time of the second Covid lockdown. Our bubble of volunteers adapted the layout to our specific needs which, of course, included that most important social area where we spend a deal of time drinking tea, eating biscuits and indulging in good-natured banter. Alongside this, work hums along in a positive and busy atmosphere. Projects, repairs and pieces for us to sell are worked on, both personal and for organisations and members

of the community.

Men's Shed Ottery is now firmly established and is recognised as being a great benefit both to Members and to the Ottery St Mary area. Our membership list is over one hundred, with fifty currently paid-up members, including a number of ladies who come to 'Community Shed' on Saturdays.

Windows from Whimple

On the right track, but there are barriers ahead

It was in May 1964 that a group of 80 Children with their teachers travelled from London Waterloo to Paignton in Devon. It was the annual two week "School Journey" of Torridon Road School, Catford SE6. To keep us occupied we all had workbooks which included questions about what we would see on the way. One was about a Bill Board proclaiming, "You are now approaching Strong Country". We also learnt how to calculate the speed of our train from little posts every ¼ of a mile by the track. My recollection is that the train was a West Country or Battle of Britain Class locomotive, apparently know as a 'Spam Tin' (Pre. Monty Python) or 'Flat top'. However, to my eyes it was modern and streamlined with a friendly train driver. So, the first time I encountered Whimple was at about 85 mph at the age of 10 and I had no idea of the impending demise of steam trains. I also did not appreciate that in 1967 the line from Salisbury to Exeter would become only single track with a few passing points on the way. An extra loop was added at Tisbury in 1983 and at Axminster in 2009.

It was considered by the 'decision makers' of the day that railways were in decline, that they were 'old' technology, and there was little need for long-term planning. Politically, the future was the car and the internal combustion engine and the new direction was for more motorways. It was clear that Western Region management at the time wanted to ensure the Waterloo route to the West Country was permanently downgraded, some say it was a kind of sabotage. When we look back at local rail history one could reasonably argue that 'our' railway is still downgraded and 'here we are in 2025'.

On 5th November 1993, John Major's Tory government passed the Railways Act soon after the general election. It has been calculated that vast amounts of money were leeched out of the railway network. There was a lack in infrastructure and rolling stock as profits and shareholders dividends became the priority. Today's train passengers are still living with the consequences of privatisation. This was part of the overall political ideology of selling public assets including energy, water, and buses, but even Thatcher thought the railway was 'a privatisation too far'. The public agreed, but it did not stop John Major.

It's fair to say there has been some investment in new trains, but it has not been shared equally across the nation. Our fragmented network has been hugely detrimental to customer service.

There have been rising costs, timetable chaos, a profusion of different fares, cancellations, service reductions, attempts to cut staff from trains and stations and, most recently, the wildly unpopular and unsuccessful attempt to close <u>all</u> ticket offices in England, and, of course, the perennial "leaves on the line". The fundamental desire is to cut the number of staff servicing the needs of customers even down to killing off the snack trolley on the Waterloo train. It is no surprise that public opinion shows overwhelming support for the re-nationalisation of railways. YouGov tracker shows 64 percent in favour of public ownership, 11 per cent opposed.

Privatisation was an experiment which is now coming to the last chapter, albeit a long one. The planned programme for Great British Railways is for a single, integrated, publicly owned railway company which would save money, cut fares, and encourage more people back onto Britain's railways — to become a public service, not for private profit, but for the public good and, significantly, to be good for the environment. Various companies will be involved.

Previously, as services deteriorated, SERUG (Salisbury to Exeter Rail Users Group) was formed in 2016 to lobby for further improvements. The group is affiliated to Railfuture, a non-political, not for profit organisation, campaigning for a better railway service for Britain. Some progress has been made through investment in better infrastructure and a few more trains. Our Whimple line was operated by South Western Railway (owned by First Group plc). It is now nationalised and is the first franchise to become part of Great British Railways. There have been critics that call it the 'snail-track' due to the average speed between Waterloo and Yeovil of just 53 mph! There are few areas of similar population and distance from London with such a slow service. Capacity west of Yeovil is restricted and insufficient to cope with such a basic timetable, especially when diversions on Great Western Railways are in operation. In essence we need more passing loops, extended sections of double track and upgraded signalling to support improved timetable resilience and frequency, notably two trains per hour from Axminster to Exeter as part of the Devon Metro Strategy. This goal will need substantial funding. Plans were set out in November 2022 for a dual section between Whimple and Cranbrook, but in September 2025 there is still only a single track disappearing off towards Exeter.

Our line currently uses the Class 159 South Western Turbo, diesel multiple units of the Sprinter family, which came into service between 1989 and 1992. These are some of the oldest trains still in use on a main line. The route is electrified from London to Basingstoke only, leaving a stretch not electrified of 122 miles to Exeter. So, current thinking is a proposal to modify redundant suburban electric units to bimode electric / battery power utilising short electrified sections to top-up the batteries. It is understood SWR and Siemens are working on the concept using their Class 450 EMUs an idea which is reported to have found favour with the Department for Transport. The Railway Industry Association's (RIA) decarbonisation proposals, published in April 2025, suggest electrification of the route as far west as Yeovil, with battery power used for the remaining distance to Exeter.

The RIA proposes fast charge stations to top up power in on-board batteries at selected points. It will be a long-term project to get brand new trains on our line, estimated to be the early 2030s. Perhaps we shall see more station roofs with solar panels or solar farms exclusively for the railways. The future looks to be relying no longer on diesel trains as part of the new programme of decarbonization. Future decarbonisation policies should give consideration to towns with over 10,000 inhabitants and that they should have a Railway Station connecting to the main line, e.g. the re-instigation of the Chard Line, (Two miles short of the main line) with a population of 13,000 (2021 Census).

In a case study, South West Trains 2017 the company ordered 90 Class 701 Alterio Trains in 2017 by Bombardier Transportation and Alstom at Derby, to update their aging stock for its commuter services in Greater London, with a roll out in 2019. But only five of the 90 trains are currently in use, due to delays in training drivers. Apparently, SWR was unable to release drivers to attend training programmes because it had too few staff to maintain the existing services. These new trains are parked up in Clapham Junction. It does seem implausible that these brand-new trains are sitting in a depot while commuters are left crammed onto outdated, overcrowded carriages like tinned sardines. Eventually, the first Alterio train carried passengers in January 2024, only to find extensive faults, mostly to do with software and the design of the driver's cab.

Other problems facing our railway are associated with geological weakness. Loss of moisture in ground formation below the track, made worse by long dry summer weather, which leads to potential collapses in embankments and subsidence in cuttings. This leads to speed restrictions and congestion on the line leading to fewer trains. Network Rail has undertaken some repairs, but it all goes back to the lack of investment under privatisation. The announcement on the 1st August 2025 signifies the scale of the problem west of Salisbury and has led to a four-hour journey from Whimple to Waterloo.

Hope was raised following the successful reopening of Okehampton station in November 2021 by the Department for Transport. Two rail projects in the west have been given the green light following July's Spending Review. The rail line between Bristol city centre and Portishead – which was last used six decades ago – will be reinstated. In our area two new stations will be built, one at Wellington in Somerset the other at Cullompton in Devon. These will improve transport links to Exeter and beyond and significantly help the new housing developments in those areas. Another date affecting our area is the 25th June 2028 when the Great Western Railway contract awarded in June 2022 is due to expire. However, we will need to wait a little longer for the Arriva Cross Country National Rail contract due to expire, this will be 12th October 2031. It links Plymouth to Scotland, via Exeter.

There is now a consultation with key stakeholders to leverage the best of both the public and private sectors, working in close partnership with private companies from freight and leasing rolling stock, to ticket retailing and the rail supply chain. One of the potential problems is to avoid Rolling Stock leasing companies charging excessive amounts to Train Operators, this being the Government body set up to run the trains, known as DFTO and branded as Great British Railways.

The consultation is due to be published at the end of the year.

Lastly, and most importantly, it is appropriate to acknowledge the hard work and dedication of the Friends of Whimple Station group whose aims are to coordinate project ideas to enhance the visible appearance of the station and promote projects. The Cider displays are great. What is clear is that despite many promises, strategic reports, regional forums, parliamentary questions and a plethora of campaign groups we still have a downgraded service. Good news? Well, with a four hour train journey from Exeter St Davids to London Waterloo one could always buy a Penguin paperback to read on the train.



A Window on Whimple's Weather - July/August 2025

So, it's official, the Met Office has declared that the summer of 2025 was the hottest ever for the UK! (At least since records began in 1884.) About 1.51 °C above the long-term mean, apparently, but it felt like more than that! Persistent high pressure systems and the very dry spring were key contributors.

July -The month started very warm, with 4 sunny days before 2 cloudier and relatively cooler days, one of which being Whimple Fest on the 5th, but it stayed dry and was a better temperature for the runners! It then hotted up again for a long sunny spell until the 18th. The hottest day (10th) reached 29.9C, 86F in old money, and all through this period it remained virtually dry. The spell ended with 3 very humid and cloudier days 16th-18th, before the weather broke on the 19th with two showery days as low pressure temporarily took over. After that brief blip, the weather improved again for the rest of the month, dry, very warm and fairly sunny. Overall, the month was very dry, only 21.4mm and 12% sunnier than average, building on the dry and sunny spring.

August – This month continued in the same vein, being generally very warm and sunny. Apart from very slight showers on 4th, 14th and 19th, it was completely dry until the 26th. This meant our lawns became brown and crisp and our farmers began to struggle with feed for cattle. The heatwave peaked on the 15th with a very hot 31.1C, 88F. A cold front moved down from the north-east early on the 21st lowering overnight temperatures to a cool 5.9C, but pressure remained high and the sun kept shining! We had a glorious long bank holiday weekend 23rd to 25th. Then the long summer sadly came to an abrupt end with 36.8mm of rain in the last 6 days, with a very wet night 28th / 29th. It was over.

It hardly seems possible that the annual Whimple Flower and Craft Show has just celebrated its 70th Anniversary! We had hoped that it would be a bumper show but although not quite being that, it was nevertheless, another very successful show. As usual, there were some initial challenges but having overcome those, the day went very well. The one constant feature of the Show is the very high standard of all the exhibits and this was endorsed by the judges after they had completed their deliberations. As with last year, we were very much indebted to Andy and Gail for the time they spent with the Primary School to encourage the children to enter some of the Classes in the Children's Sections. This again proved a very successful mission as we had a very good entry from them in some of their classes. Although there were two less exhibitors this year, there was an increase in the number of exhibits. This year we had 35 exhibitors in the adult classes and 121 in the Junior Classes giving a total of 156 exhibitors. This then resulted in a total of 450 exhibits which, although not a record entry, was 29 more than last year.

We were very pleased to see that, with only one exception, all the Junior classes had entries this year. With the two age groups that the school children were able to enter, the Judge certainly had her work cut out going through all the exhibits in these classes. Once again, there were some very impressive exhibits, so congratulations to all the children who entered this year. And so to the results! First of all, in the classes for the under fives, the Owen Cup was won by Ben Bowker and in the classes for the five to eight year olds, it was Lucy Shaw who won The Basildon Award. For the classes in the 9 to 11 years age group, it was Alice Shaw who won The Fletcher Cup and in the 12 to 15 years age group, the Children's Challenge Cup was won by Emily Shaw.

The Photography classes always produce some excellent exhibits. Despite a lower entry than usual for this Section, the judge once again commented on the very high standard. After some very difficult decisions, Marylin Mills came out as the overall winner winning the Paul Henry GC Memorial Cup. The Arts and Crafts section once again demonstrated what skilful residents we have in the village. The overall winner in this section was Vicky Clough who won The Len Rose Memorial Cup and Vicky also won The Whimple Craft Cup for the best exhibit in this section. The Homecraft section never fails to deliver a wonderful display of mouth watering exhibits and with a significant increase in the entries this year, the judge had the unenviable task of deciding which exhibits were the best. However, after all the sampling was over it was Julie Hosgood who was the overall winner and received the Sir Henry Imbert-Terry Cup.

And so to the flower arranging classes where the standard was as high as ever. The overall winner in this section was Julie Hosgood winning The Frances Pratt Memorial Cup. The Roy Horsburgh Trophy for the runner up was shared by Melonie Bolden and Margaret Bucknell. When it came to the best exhibit in these classes, which was voted for by everyone who came to the show, The Marie Louise Grout Cup, was won by Julie Hosgood whose exhibit received the highest number of votes.

Last, and by no means least, we have the Classes for the Vegetables, Flowers and Pot Plants. For those of us who entered these classes, we seem to get even more challenging growing conditions every year and this year was certainly no exception! Despite that, we were very pleased to see an increase of some 71 exhibits in these three sections, with only three classes not having any entries. Considering the challenges of the very warm growing conditions, the judge was very impressed with the high standard of the exhibits. In the Pot Plants Section, and for the fourth year running, the winner of The Briar Shield for the most points was Paul Wilson. In the Vegetable Classes there were some wonderful entries. As with last year, we had a number of new class winners which was good to see. It was no surprise that, after gaining no less than eighteen first prizes in the vegetable classes, Mike Hawkins was once again the winner of the Slewton Cup for the most points. The runner up in this section, winning The Cranny Brook Cup was Donna Baker. The Flower Classes did not disappoint and there were certainly some outstanding exhibits to admire. In this section, it was a much more evenly contested, but Mike Hawkins was the eventual winner of The Win and Bob Shepherd Cup for the most points in these classes. The runner up with the second highest number of points was Paul Wilson who won The President's Cup. The Otter Nurseries Rose Bowl for the best exhibit in the Flower Section was awarded to Mike Hawkins for one of his dahlia exhibits. Now, when all the points in these two sections were added together, we eventually came out with the winner of the Whimple Folk Cup and once again it was Mike Hawkins who took the honours, so many congratulations to him. We were very pleased that Malcolm Randall took up our invitation to present the prizes this year. We have been very grateful for the support that he and Marianne have given the WGC.
